Tutoring Group

School attainment was the key measure of the intervention group. Looking specifically at the children involved in small tutor groups, we can see Sep 2020 – July 2021 standardised scores.

Clear evidence illustrates children have increased their age standardised scores significantly for all of those children involved in maths and English tutoring. With mean English progress being 10 standardised points and maths 12 points. The 5 Of pupils within the group moving passed the 100 score too is significant with an additional 3 pupils in English and 9 out of 13 pupils in maths.

Readiness to Learn Group - Sept 2021-2022

Readiness to Learn Group is to be established for a small group of Boys within LKS2 from September 2021. School baselines will be taken in September and then assessed again at at February half-term.

Summary to date:

Both sets of data (English and Maths) are comparable to the national average for pupil age. It is clear that we have increased all individual scores with the use of the Covid Catch up funding and the intervention has proved successful.

Whilst this Covid Catch Up has been a priority and the project has been a success.
